# **Impact Poverty**

A one year, in-depth study of poverty in Paducah-McCracken County. The study resulted in a 10 year, community-wide action plan to help reduce our poverty rate.

## **Critical Care and Community Wellness**

Assess critical needs and challenges that are not being met with current programs -- help those "falling through the cracks"; plan for a comprehensive wellness program to help those in need; create a plan to become a healthier community.

- Kentucky Cares brought to Paducah-McCracken County.
- Healthy Paducah formed. Secured a \$400,000 grant for the Rotary Health park.
- Purchase Area Health Connections formed.
- Between PAHC and Healthy Paducah, over 1.5 million in grants received since 2015 through HRSA and Foundation for Healthy Kentucky.

#### **Substance Abuse**

Focus community attention and resources on the drug problem plaguing our community and adversely impacting employability, the future of children/young adults, and families in poverty.

- McCracken County Agency for Substance Abuse and Policy formed.
- Approximately \$56,000 received for harm reduction and ASAP grants since 2016.

## **Support Systems**

The Impact Poverty Task Force and Getting Ahead investigators have concluded that the vast majority of social service organizations working with those in poverty in Paducah-McCracken County are not successful in helping clients out of poverty. In fact, one of the unintended consequences of assistance is that it aids in keeping people in poverty.

- Use of Charity Tracker encouraged.
- United Way allocations process, communication with partner agencies, and the Independence Bank nonprofit coalition are all encouraged to strengthen nonprofit collaboration.
- Educational opportunities offered to clients of nonprofit agencies such as budgeting classes, nutrition classes, etc.

#### **Kids and Education**

Break the cycle of generational poverty by impacting children through education, mentoring, and exposure to opportunities.

- Reading PALS established with 24 students and mentors. The PALS program now has 150 students and mentors.
- McCracken County Early Childhood Council formed with \$22,000 in grants received annually.

## **Perceptions**

Create a comprehensive community-wide program to change perceptions of the community and those in poverty. Adopt the Bridges Out of Poverty philosophy and implement Getting Ahead groups; make them go viral; reach a critical mass.

- Getting Ahead classes conducted.
- Bridges Out of Poverty offered quarterly.

#### **Jobs**

Create opportunities for those in poverty to obtain living wage employment through networking, barrier removal and coaching.

An ongoing focus for our community.
